Hip Hop activist Rosa Clemente, a member of the Malcolm X Grassroots Movement, Black August and The Hip-Hop Caucus; long-time political organizer Angela Woodson, co-chair of the first-ever National Hip-Hop Political Convention in 2004 and director of Faith-based Initiatives for the Ohio Governor's Office; and hip-hop artist M-1, one half of the innovative hip-hop / rap duo dead prez – will be at Fairfield University's John A.
